Key achievements



GWEN worked face-to-face with more than 2'021 persons through direct programs such as

- School visits (SRHR, pads distribution): 1'109 participants
 - Homework and learning (library and computer use): 264 participants
 - Mother/Father-Daughter conversations: 324 participants
 - Couple dialogues: 113 participants
 - Community cinema: 112 participants
 - Digital competence training: 87 participants
 - Arts therapy activities and vision learning with teenage mothers: 44 participants
 - Engagemnts with traditional leaders: 32 participants
 - Network events: 34 participants
 - Internal monitoring and evaluation: 7
 - Gender champions traning: 7
 - Psychosocial support: 41 individuals

GWEN also reached 1'525 on events such as

- 16 days of activism against Gender Based Violence
- Day of African Girl Child
- Womens Day

- GWEN continued its partnership with the Department of Social Development which is responsible for child protection in implementing activities.

Sanitary wear and school visit

1'109 young adolescent girls were reached with washable sanitary wear and school visits in different schools.



Homework and learning

Homework and learning reached 264 participants and 87 were reached through digital competence training.



Mother/father-daughter dialogue

324 mother, fathers and their daughters, were reached through a mother to daughter dialogue and father to daughter dialogue

- Girls and mothers were equipped with information on unpaid care work, menstrual hygiene and SRHR.
- Fathers were equipped with information on SRHR, positive parenting and gender roles which helped fathers to be more empathetic, supportive and motivated to rethink traditional roles.



Couple dialogues

GWEN engaged 113 couples on gender based violence and unpaid care work.



Community cinema event

112 mostly young people, adolescent girls and boys participated in community cinema event.

- Watching and discussion movies relevant to the issues of families and gender justice.



Interaction with teenage mothers

44 teenage mothers were reached through arts therapy and vision board setting.



Networking event

34 were reached through networking event in partnership with Gender Commission.



Events

1'525 were reached through events such as the Day of the African Child, 16 Days of Activism against Gender based violence, International Womens Day and Family Day.

Managing gender-based conflicts



41 cases of gender-based conflicts were managed/intervened on family level.

- Types of cases
 - Gender-based violence (domestic violence, marital disputes, elder abuse)
 - Sexual violence including rape of minors and attempted rape
 - Child protection: child marriage, abandonment, sexual exploitation
 - Forced marriage and property dispossession
 - Teenage pregnancy and adolescent SRHR-related emergencies
- We do not report in further detail, because this is a sensitive area. GWEN keeps case files.
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Support services provided

- Psychosocial counselling and safety planning
- Legal information, referrals
- Emergency assistance (food, medical, transport)
- Family mediation and conflict resolution
- Follow-up and referral to statutory authorities
